Dear Members of the Arkansas General Assembly:

The undersigned Arkansas businesses, business associations and professional associations join to express intense opposition to HB 1158, as it will have a negative impact on businesses across Arkansas and will jeopardize the safety and security of Arkansas consumers and your constituents.

The stated purpose of HB 1158 is to "allow a person to engage in a lawful occupation free from unnecessary regulation." This is accomplished by rendering Arkansas's professional and occupational licensing standards pointless.

Government regulation subjects individuals and businesses to public oversight to ensure the proper delivery of services to the public. This intrusion is the widely-accepted by-product of the passage of laws and implementation of rules and regulations. Unforeseen and unintended consequences frequently occur. It is not the business community's intent to stand in the way of responsible free-market and regulatory reforms. However, stripping away such measures is not the solution to bureaucratic overreach. HB 1158 attempts to address such intrusion by eliminating *all* industry standards promulgated by Arkansas's Executive Branch and adopted by Arkansas's Legislature. This bill makes no effort to pinpoint specific areas of concern but eliminates licensing requirements for all professions – from a license to represent *you* in court, to a license to install electrical wiring in *your* home. This bill is misconceived, overly broad and puts businesses and consumers alike in harm's way.

On February 12, testimony was offered in Committee that if passed, HB 1158 would create 8,000 new jobs in Arkansas. No information was provided substantiating this claim;

however, the logical conclusion is that HB 1158 would promote widespread delivery of unqualified services to unsuspecting Arkansas businesses and consumers that could cause a public safety risk. It would create a "right" to deliver a service without appropriate skill or experience. Bonding could not be guaranteed, the cost of professional insurance would be prohibitive and many would not obtain insurance absent regulatory requirement.

The Arkansas Legislature appropriates limited resources to the state's boards and commissions. Appointees selected and vetted by the Governor will be overwhelmed by litigation over licensing issues and those qualified to serve would become increasingly reluctant to do so. HB 1158 undermines the Governor and the ability of the Executive Branch to effectively and efficiently execute its duties.

HB 1158 creates the potential for unwarranted chaos and creates an unlicensed environment where anyone may hold themselves out as a professional. This puts Arkansas out of step with *all* other states by negatively impacting the value and mobility of our professional licenses and assigning heightened risk to our commercial and residential population. Nearly identical legislative attempts have occurred in other states across the U.S. Each has been summarily defeated. Arkansas must not be the first to pass legislation fraught with unnecessary and potentially damaging errors.

We respectfully request and strongly advocate for your immediate opposition to HB 1158.

STATE CHAMBER/AIA BILL TRACKING

To date, the House has filed 395 bills and the Senate has filed 416 bills.

The State Chamber/AIA is tracking 197 bills and resolutions.

New bills added to State Chamber/AIA tracking today:

HB 1383	Collins, Charlie (R)	Reduces the income tax on capital gains. (Shell bill)
HB 1384	Collins, Charlie (R)	Reduces the state income tax. (Shell bill)
HB 1387	Dotson, Jim (R)	Increases the maximum sale price of a used motor vehicle that qualifies for the exemption from sales tax from \$4,000 to \$5,000.
HB 1392	House, Douglas (R)	Provides architects and engineers immunity from damages for personal injury, death, property damage or other loss related to the person's errors or emissions in performance of voluntary professional service.
SB 389	Stubblefield, Gary (R)	Sets the date for the Arkansas presidential primary election on the first Tuesday in March of the year when the national party conventions are held.
SB 392	Chesterfield, Linda (D)	Authorizes the installation and use of distributed generation of electricity.
SB 396	Chesterfield, Linda (D)	Requires judgments in property disputes to award the prevailing party's actual damages, attorney's fee and costs, and may include punitive damages and other relief including possession of encroaching property such as fencing and structures.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT PACKAGE

Sen. Jane English's package of workforce development bills have all been referred to the Senate Committee on Education. All of these bills were developed by Sen. English in cooperation with the State Chamber/AIA.

SB 368 is sponsored by Rep. Charlotte Douglas in the House. The bill would create a new statewide workforce development system and rename the Board of Career Education as The Career Education and Workforce Development Board. The purpose of the Board is to "develop and monitor a state plan for vocational-technical education which shall include at least the establishment of at least one area vocational center in each education service cooperative service area and in Pulaski County."

SB 369 and **SB 372** would eliminate specified service areas for two-year colleges and technical schools, removes the duty of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board to determine service areas for two-year institutions of higher education.

SB 370 and **SB 371** would expand public schools partnering with higher educational institutions by allowing school districts to use national school lunch funds to provide concurrent courses or technical education options to students in grades eight through twelve.
